Mt. Hope A.M.E. Church Site and Cemetery 7043 Allentown Road, Camp Springs, Md. Priv/Unocc/Cemetery/Unexposed

This is the site of an African Methodist Episcopal Church, established and constructed <u>circa</u> 1891. The church structure was destroyed in the late 1960's, but the cemetery remains and is still in use.

In 1891, two acres of land in the Camp Springs area were sold to three Black trustees "of a certain colored Methodist Church" for the purpose of "erecting thereon a house for public worship." A small church was built and came to be known as Mt. Hope A.M.E. Church; its congregation joined in activities with the previously established congregations of Union-Bethel and Metropolitan A.M.E. Churches. In 1902, the Board of County School Commissioners responded to the request of the Black community of Camp Springs, and ordered that a "colored" school be established there. Following the regular pattern, the school site was selected near a well-established Black church, in this case, Mt. Hope, thus beginning a long partnership between church and school. In 1924, at the time of the building of the second (Rosenwald) school, the trustees of Mt. Hope gave permission to the school children to use the two-acre churchyard as a playground. The school was closed in 1954 and sold in the next year. In the late 1960's, Mt. Hope A.M.E. Church closed, and its congregation merged with that of Union Bethel A.M.E. Church in T.B. Because, together with the schoolhouse, Mt. Hope was for a long time a focal point for the Black community of Camp Springs, it is a significant site in the Black history of Prince George's County.

In 1891, John and Alice Roberts sold two acres of land to David Reeder, Henry T. Mills, and James E. Young, "trustees of a certain colored Methodist Church", for the purpose of "erecting thereon a house for public worship." A small church was built and came to be known as Mt. Hope A.M.E. Church; its congregation joined in activities with the previously established congregations of Union-Bethel A.M.E. (T.B.) and Metropolitan A.M.E. (Clinton) churches.

In 1902, the Board of County School Commissioners of P.G. County responded to the request of the black community of Camp Springs, and ordered that a "colored" school be established there. Following the regular pattern, a school site was selected near a well-established black church, in this case, Mt. Hope. Thus began a long partnership between church and school. In 1924, at the time of the building of the second school, the trustees of Mt. Hope, Jeremiah Bruce, John Dodson, and John H. Wright, gave permission to the school children to use the two-acre church grounds as a playground.

This partnership ended in 1954, when the school was closed, and sold at auction a year later. In the late 1960's, Mt. Hope A.M.E. Church was closed, and its congregation merged with Union-Bethel A.M.E. Church in T.B.


